Introduction

History

Lamar University opened its first extension center in Orange, in the fall of 1969, with classes in the former Tilley Elementary School. In 1971, the Texas Legislature passed legislation allowing Lamar University to operate a two-year educational center; thus, removing the extension status and allowing students to take two full years of coursework on the Orange campus.

In 1971, fire destroyed the building; and a spirited community-wide fundraising effort netted more than \$250,000 for the purchase of the former Sabine Supply Company building, located at 410 Front St., in Orange. Classes began at the new location in the fall of 1971.

Since that time, facilities, enrollment, and course offerings have grown steadily. Instructional programs are offered in five divisions: Liberal Arts, Mathematics and Science, Business and Technology, Education, and Allied Health.

The Texas Legislature authorized the creation of the Lamar University System in 1983. In 1991 the legislature provided degree-granting authority to Lamar University – Orange (LU-O). Effective Sept. 1, 1995, LU-O, along with sister institutions in Port Arthur and Beaumont, became part of the Texas State University System (TSUS). With system offices in Austin, the TSUS also includes Sam Houston State University, Texas State University - San Marcos, Sul Ross State University and Sul Ross State University Rio Grande College.

During the 1999 legislative session, Lamar University - Orange was officially renamed Lamar State College Orange (LSCO), and funds totaling nearly \$10 million were authorized for a new main building, a central plant, and campus infrastructure. The building was occupied in May 2001. The campus has since grown to twelve buildings spanning across three city blocks and beginning in the Spring 2024 semester LSCO will offer courses at a new satellite location in Lumberton, TX.





Dr. Thomas A. Johnson was appointed as President of Lamar State College Orange by the Texas State University System Board of Regents on September 4th, 2018. Dr. Johnson succeeds former LSCO President Mike Shahan, who served as the President of LSCO for twenty-four years.

Lamar State College Orange currently has a student body of approximately 3,100. Two-year academic programs are offered in Business, Communication, Computer Science, Criminal Justice, Teaching, Liberal Arts, Natural Science, and Sociology. These academic programs lead to Associate of Science degrees and will transfer to four-year institutions for students seeking baccalaureate degrees. Thirty technical programs are available, leading to associate of applied Science degrees and certificates of completion. Some of these degrees include Process Operating, Maritime, Welding, Dental Assisting, Pharmacy Technology, and Nursing. Customized training programs to meet the needs of local business and industry are offered through the Continuing and Workforce Education Department.

Governance

A board of nine regents, appointed by the governor and approved by the state senate for terms of six years, governs the Texas State University System. The Board of Regents delegates the direction of university affairs to the presidents, campus administrative officers and faculty.



Accreditation

Lamar State College Orange is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges to award the Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, Associate of Applied Science degrees, and Certificates of Completion. Community Services and Workforce Education Programs



The Brown Estate

The Brown Estate is a conference and meeting facility located off Highway 90 west of Orange. It is a center of educational, cultural, and social activity, which serves the citizens of Orange County and the surrounding area. The 68 acres of scenic landscaped grounds, including lakes and greenhouses, feature a graceful mansion built and decorated in the Southern antebellum plantation tradition.

LSCO received the estate in 1976 as a gift from the four sons of the late Edgar W. Brown Jr., an Orange businessman and philanthropist, who served as a charter member of the Lamar University Foundation, Inc. The property, which is open to the public for tours, provides

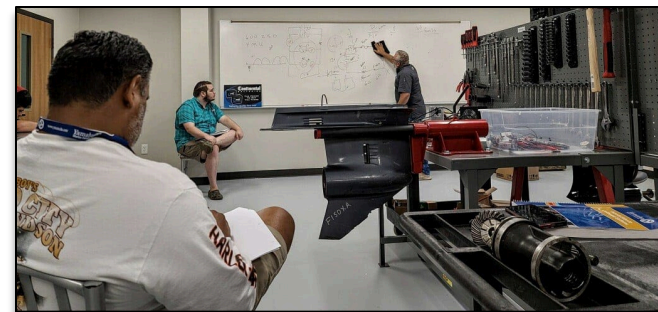
visitors with insights into the accomplishments and lifestyle of one of the region's leading citizens. The center can be reserved for seminars, meetings, planning retreats, and other public service activities.

Workforce Education

The Community and Workforce Education department at Lamar State College Orange provides non-credit learning opportunities for the community as well as customized training programs to meet the needs of local businesses and industry. Community and Workforce Education classes are open to everyone. The goal of these courses is to increase student's knowledge and skills needed for their current jobs and preparation for future career advancement.

Non-credit courses are open to interested adults without regard to eligibility for admission to college-credit programs. Lamar State College Orange will award continuing education units (CEUs) to those who complete continuing education courses administered by the college. In no instance should the award of CEUs be equated with college credit toward a degree.

The Office of Continuing Education and Workforce Development offers several customized business and industrial training programs. These programs are designed to fit the needs of local employers. Training can take place at a plant or office location, or on the Lamar State College Orange campus. The division has worked with local business and industry to deliver courses in computer technology, supervisory training, business communication and maintenance technology. Courses may be structured in the form of one-day seminars or multi-faceted, long-term training



Degrees and Certificates

Associate of Arts (AA) and Associate of Science (AS) Degrees

AA and AS degrees are designed to transfer to a four-year institution and form the basis for several career options and concentrations. The student must select courses that provide the best preparation in a particular major field at the specific institution planned for transfer.

The AA and AS curricula found in this section include electives as well as required courses for particular concentrations of study. It is imperative that a transferring student work closely with an academic advisor to plan a successful program for the selected senior institution. Students pursuing Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degrees must meet the testing requirements of the Texas Success Initiative (TSI).

Associate of Applied Science (AAS) Degrees

Curricula leading to the AAS degrees are intense programs of study designed to prepare students for employment after graduation. All programs are developed to ensure students achieve competencies in job skills. Some courses may transfer to four-year institutions, but students planning to pursue bachelors' degrees should work closely with an academic advisor to plan for successful transfer of coursework. Requirements for the AAS degree include general education courses, specified courses in the chosen areas of study and a capstone or external learning experience course. Students pursuing Associate of Science degrees must meet the testing requirements of the Texas Success Initiative (TSI).

Certificates of Completion

Certified programs are traditionally one-year courses of study that provide specialized technical career training. Successful students develop essential skills and gain technical background that prepares them to enter the workforce. All certificate programs offered at LSCO are exempt from the testing requirements of the Texas Success Initiative (TSI), except Information Technology Support Assistant, Medical Administrative Assistant, and Vocational Nursing.

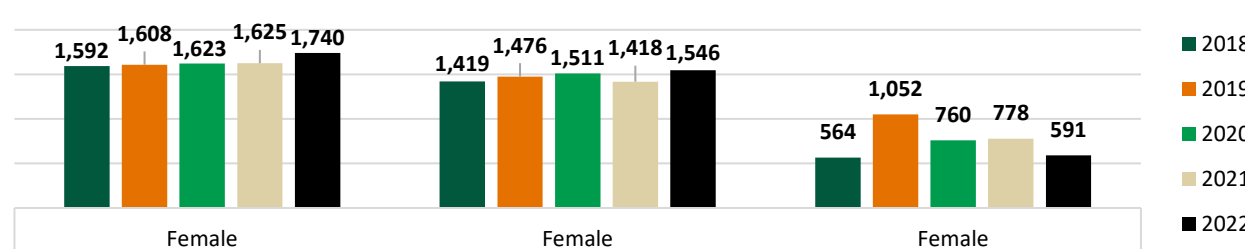
Male Enrollment by Academic Year and Term



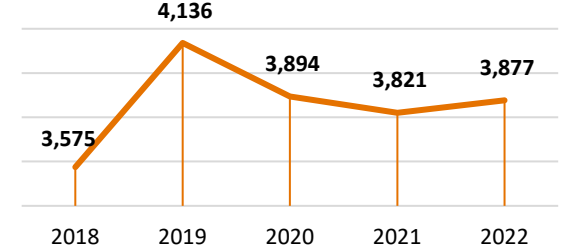
Male Total Enrollment



Female Enrollment by Academic Year and Term



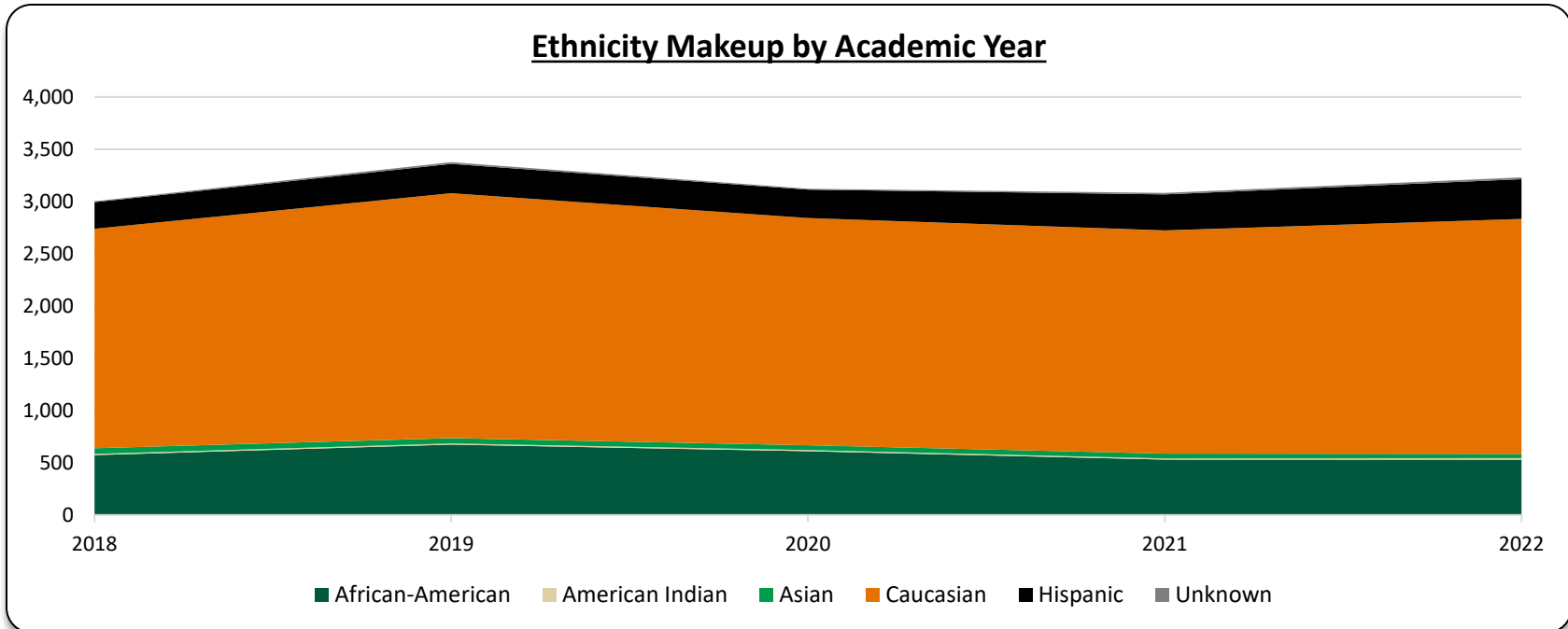
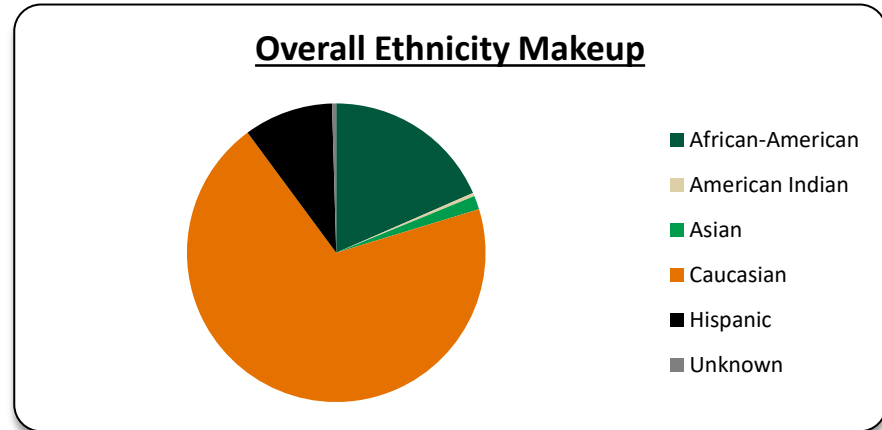

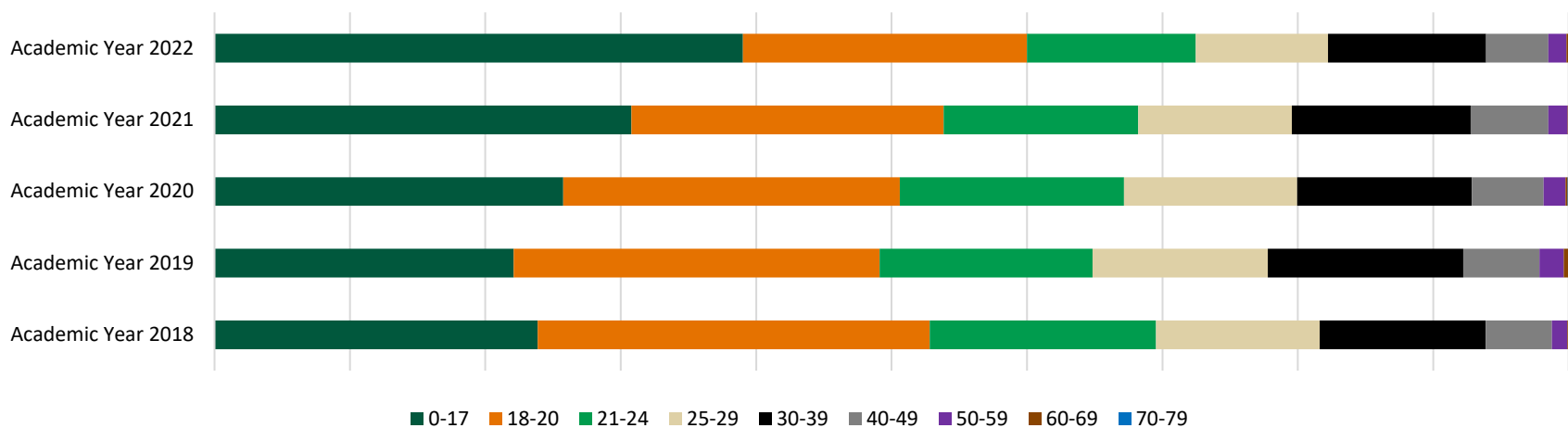
Enrollment by Age Group

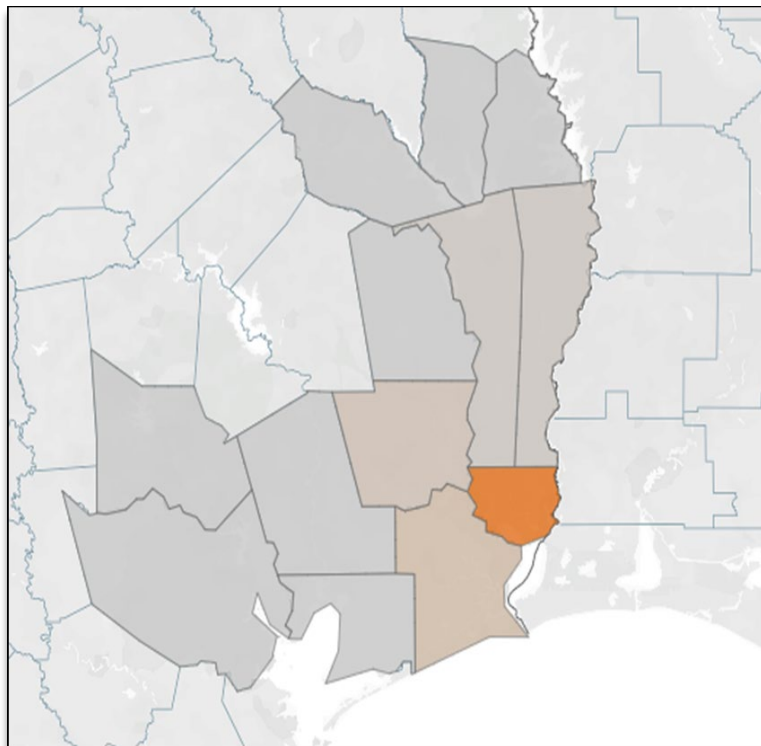
Student Age Makeup by Academic Year



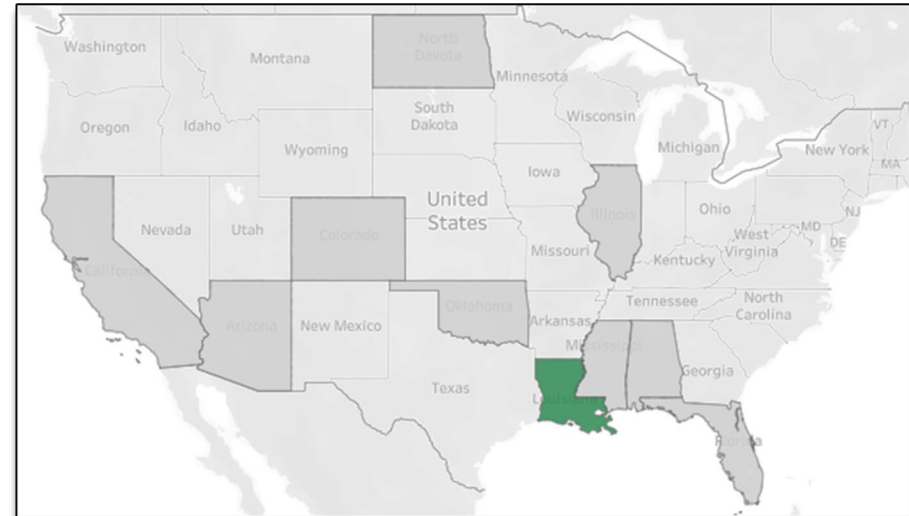

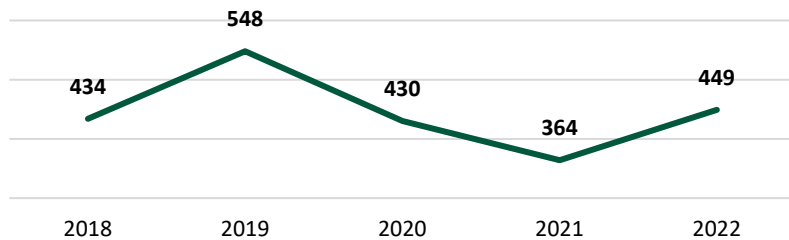

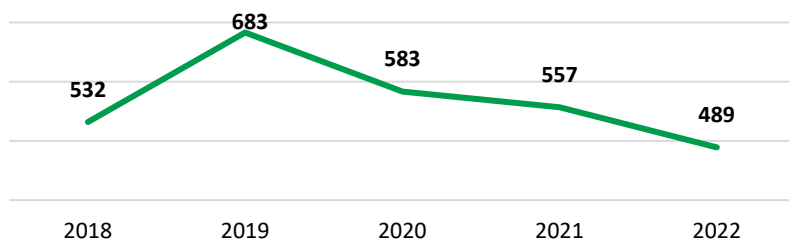
Unduplicated First-Time Student Enrollment Trend



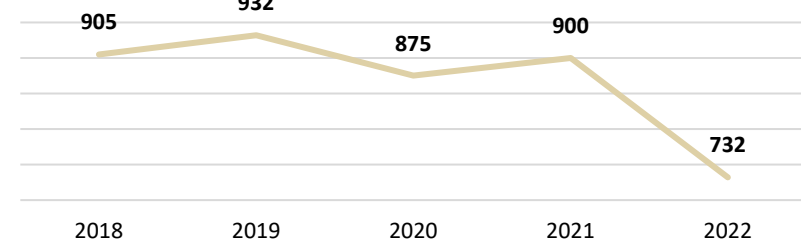
Unduplicated Transfer Student Enrollment Trend



Unduplicated Returning Student Enrollment Trend

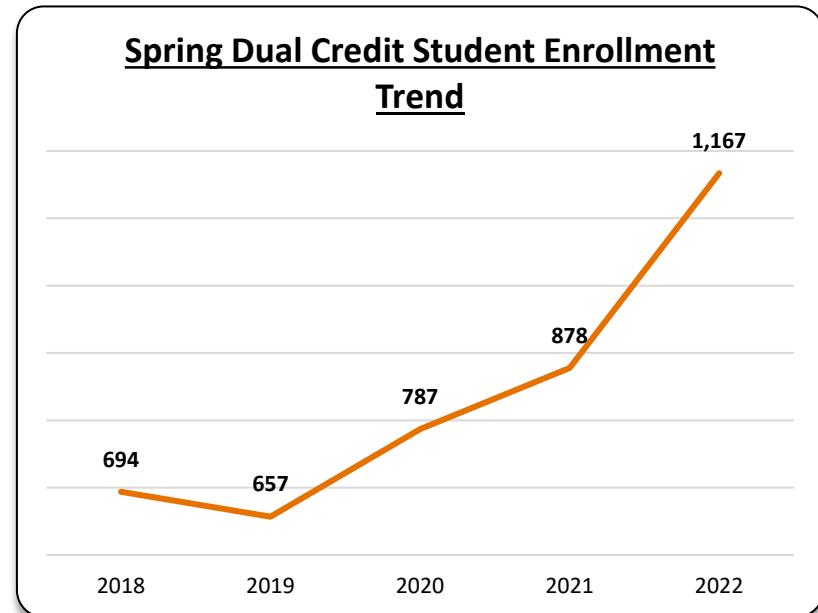
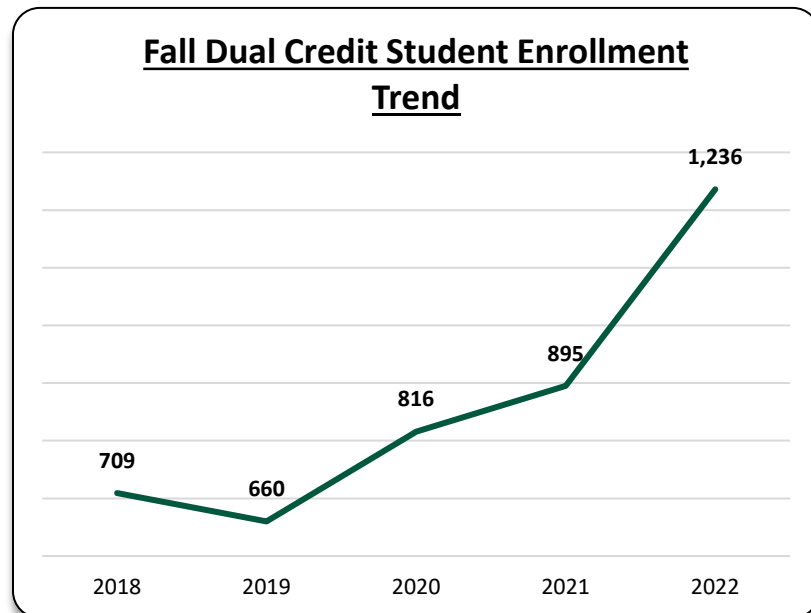


Unduplicated Continuing Student Enrollment Trend



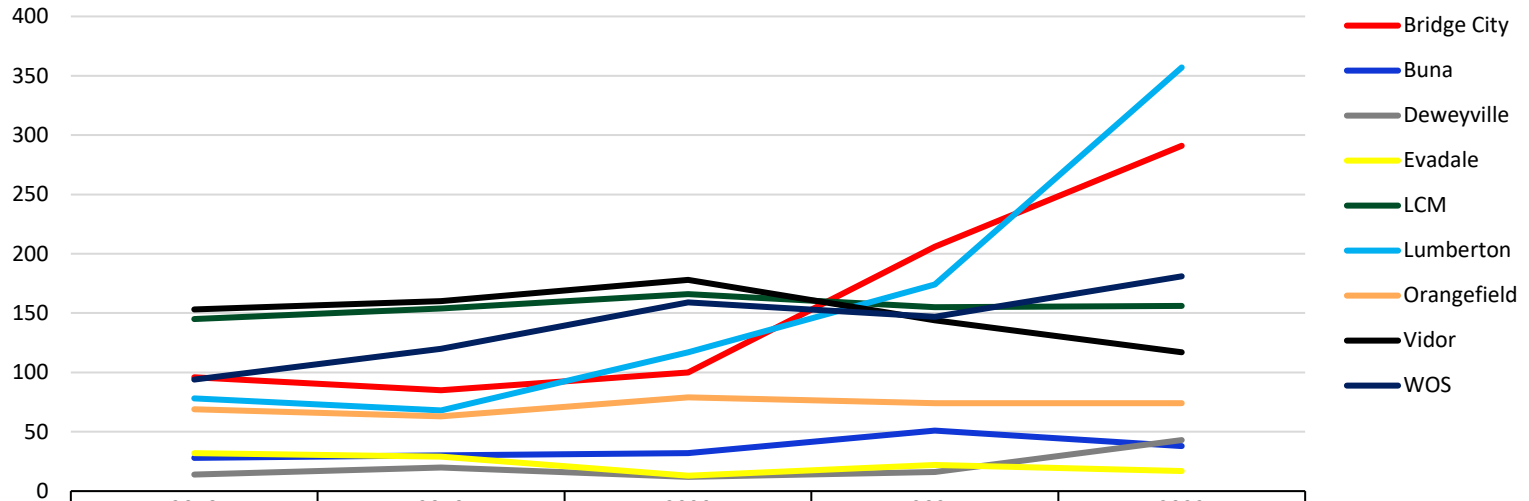

Annual Unduplicated Dual Credit Enrollment by District

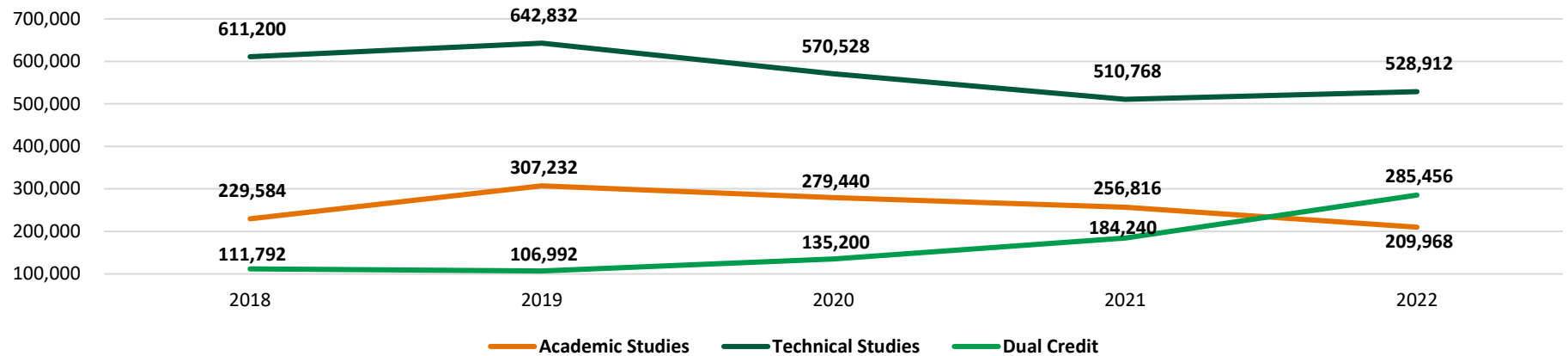

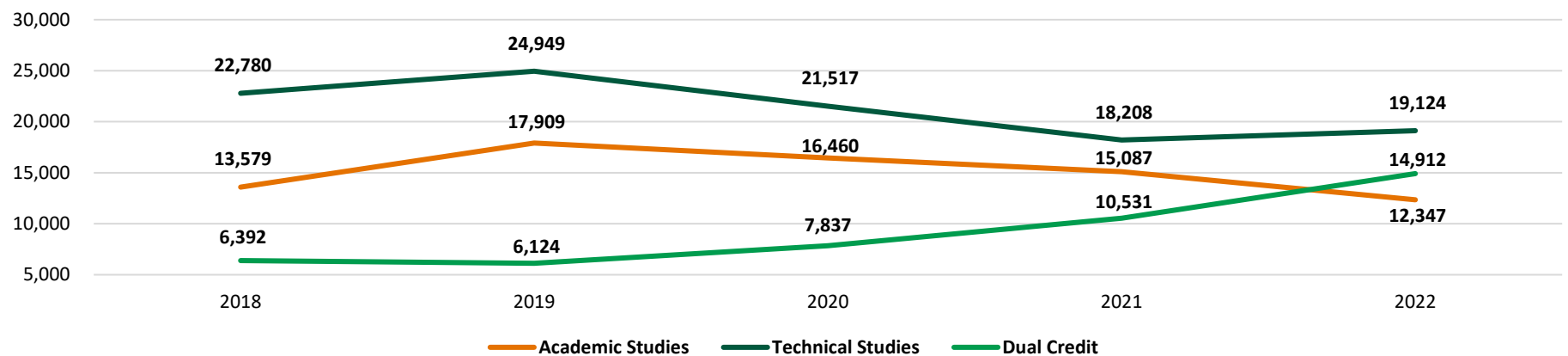

Annual Contact Hour Trend by Department



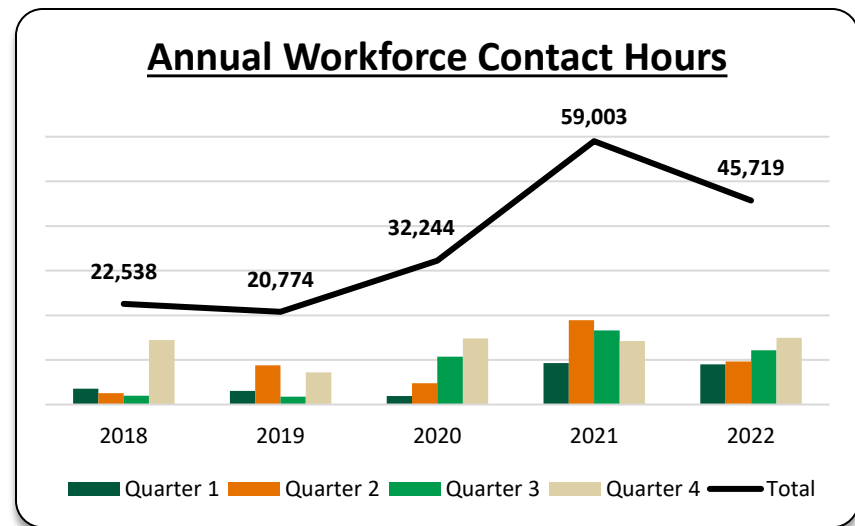
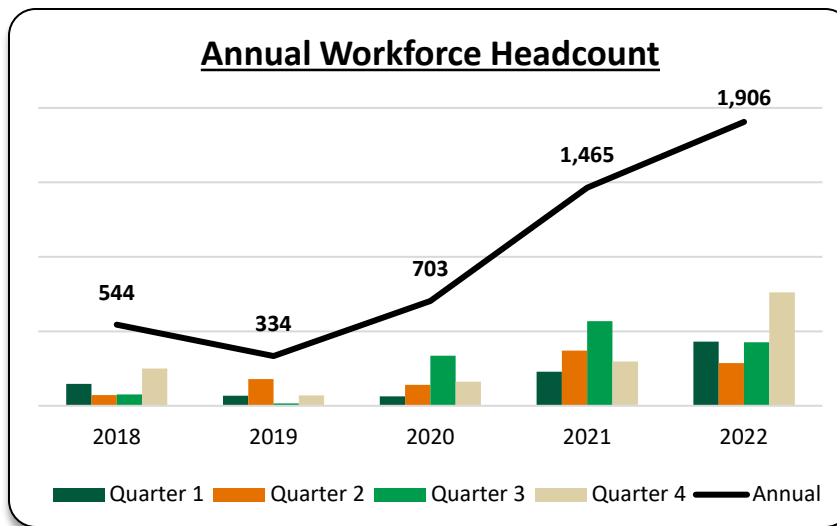
Annual Credit Hour Trend by Department





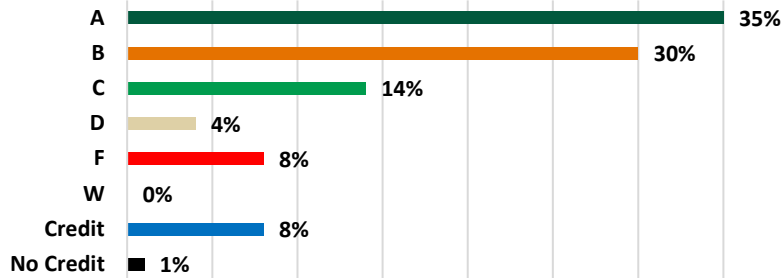

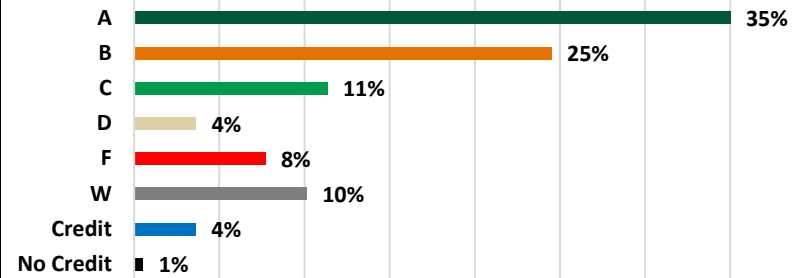




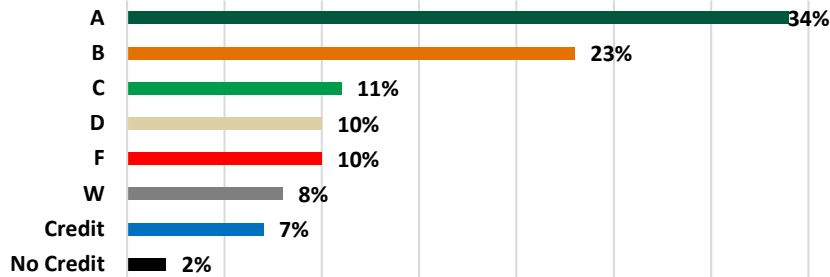
Academic Year 2018: Grade Distribution Chart



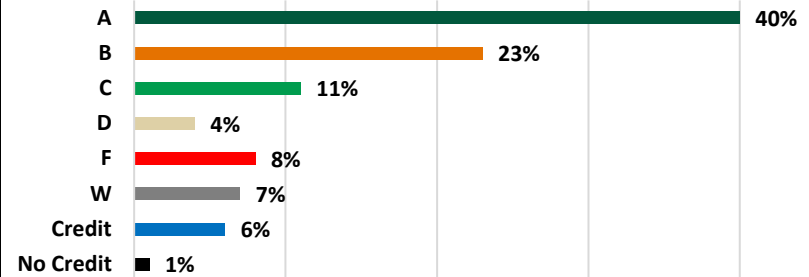
Academic Year 2019: Grade Distribution Chart



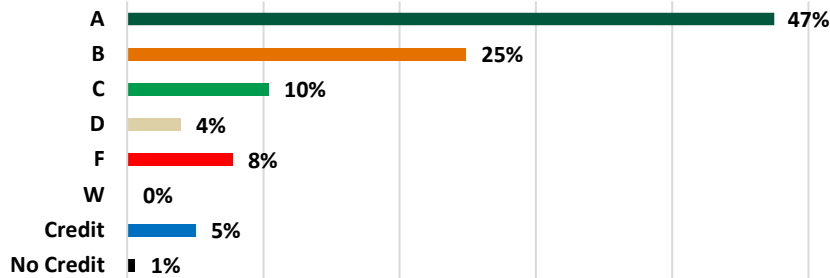
Academic Year 2020: Grade Distribution Chart



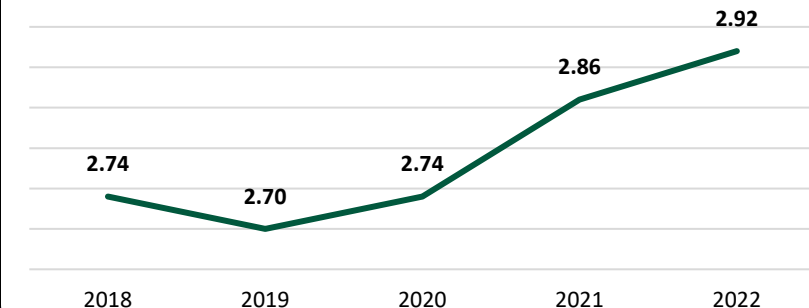
Academic Year 2021: Grade Distribution Chart

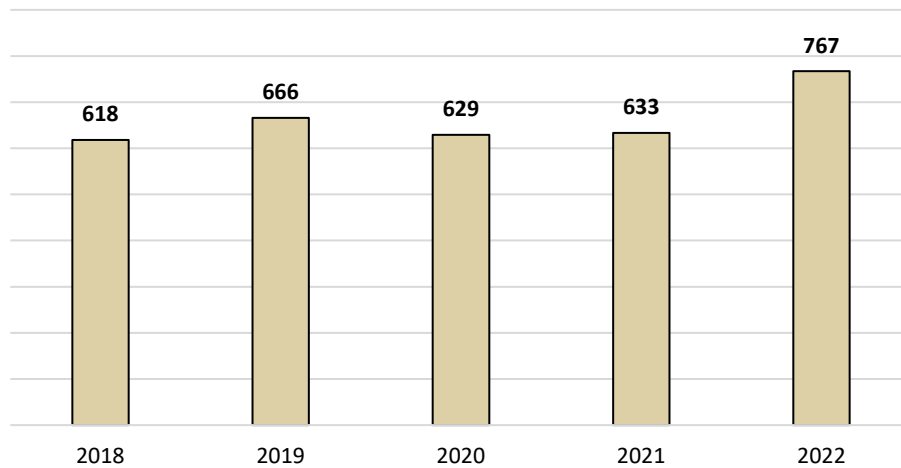

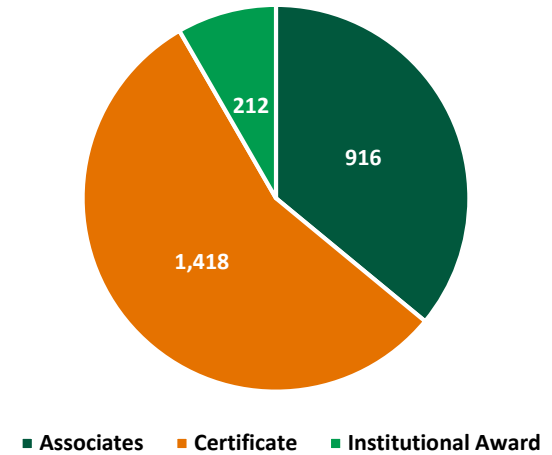

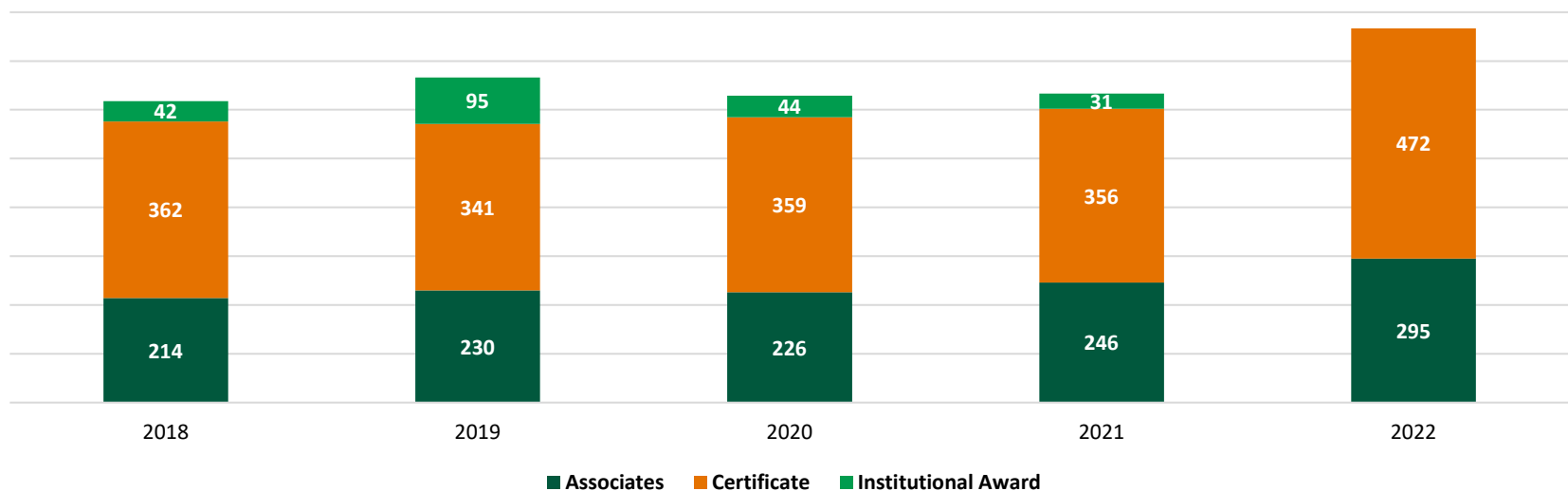
Total Awards by Academic Year

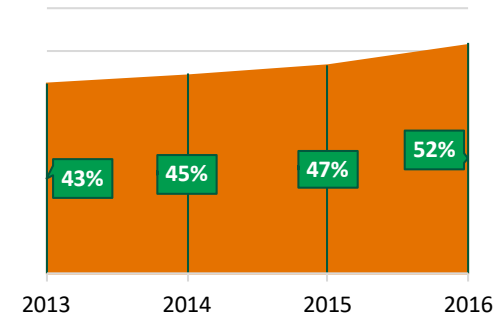

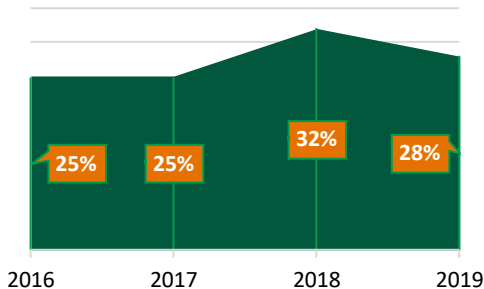
Six-Year Persistence Rate

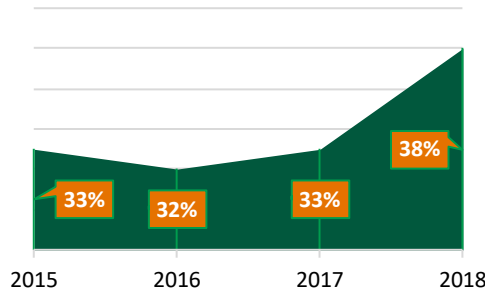
Graduation Rates

Three-Year Graduation Rate



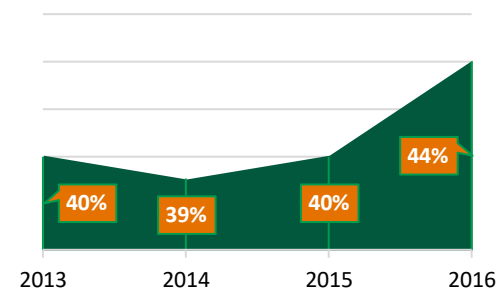
